# Bios

**Samuel Rocha** is a philosopher of education with expertise in phenomenology and aesthetics in the (Latin)American and Continental philosophical traditions. For two years he was the Owen Duston Visiting Assistant Professor in philosophy and teacher education at Wabash College and presently is an assistant professor in the educational foundations and research graduate program at the University of North Dakota. He is also the president of the

Society for the Philosophical Study of Education and an

active member of the Philosophy of Education Society. Rocha has published over twenty-five scholarly articles, chapters, and reviews, hundreds of essays and posts at Patheos, First Things, Contending Modernities, Vox Nova and other online publications, along with a collection of essays and a chapbook of poetry. His latest book, *A Primer for Philosophy and Education*, is an illustrated introduction to the field and his next book, *Education, Study, and the Human Person*, will be published in 2014 by Atropos Press.

**Eduardo Mendieta** is professor of philosophy, and chair of the department of philosophy, at the State University of New York, Stony Brook. He is the author of *The Adventures of Transcendental Philosophy* (Rowman & Littlefield, 2002) and *Global Fragments: Globalizations, Latinamericanisms, and Critical Theory* (SUNY Press, 2007). He is also co-editor with Jonathan VanAntwerpen of *The Power of Religion in the Public Sphere* (Columbia University Press, 2011), and with Craig Calhoun and Jonathan VanAntwerpen of *Habermas and Religion* (Polity, forthcoming), and with Stuart Elden of *Reading Kant's Geography* (SUNY Press, 2011) He is presently at work on another book entitled *The Philosophical Animal*.

**Linda Martín Alcoff** is Professor of Philosophy at Hunter College and the CUNY Graduate Center. Martín Alcoff has degrees from Georgia State University and Brown University, and has held positions at Syracuse University, SUNY Stony Brook and Kalamazoo College, and visiting appointments at Cornell, Brown, Florida Atlantic University, and the University of Aarhus. Her writings have focused on social identity and race, epistemology and politics, sexual violence, Foucault, Dussel, and Latino issues in philosophy. She has written two books: *Visible Identities: Race, Gender and the Self* (Oxford 2006), *Real Knowing: New Versions of the Coherence Theory* (Cornell 1996); and she has edited ten. She is a co-editor of *Hypatia: A Journal of Feminist Philosophy*. She has held an ACLS Fellowship, a Society for the Humanities at Cornell University Fellowship, and she was named one of Syracuse University's first Meredith Professors for Teaching Excellence. She is President of the American Philosophical Association, Eastern Division, for 2012-2013, and has also served on its Executive Committee, Nominating Committee, Program Committee, Committee on the Status of Women, and as Chair of the Committee on Hispanics/Latinos. She also served as Co-Director of SPEP (the Society for Phenomenology and Existential Philosophy). She was named the Distinguished Woman in Philosophy for 2005 by the Society for Women in Philosophy, and in 2006 she was named one of the 100 Most Influential Hispanics in the United States by Hispanic Business magazine. She is originally from Panama, but lives today happily in Brooklyn.

**Maximiliano Valerio López** is a Professor in the Faculty of Education at the Federal University of Juiz de Fora, Brasil. He received his doctorate and MA in Education with a focus on Philosophy of Education from the State University of Rio de Janeiro. In addition, he holds a specialized degree in the teaching of Philosophy from the University of Brasilia and an undergraduate degree from the National University of Cuyo in Argentina. Maximiliano is the coordinator of NEFPE (Studies on Philosophy, Poetics and Education). His research interests are in poetics of education, bio-politics and colonialism, philosophical experience and practices.
